

Message from the Superintendent

Dear Parents, Guardians, Staff, and Students,

Thank you to all who joined us at the new Middle School in the Recital Hall on February 7, 2023, for our budget Deliberative Session.

Despite an 8.2% inflation at the time of its development, the 2023-2024 Oyster River Cooperative District's budget only sees a 1.54% increase from the previous year. It is one of our smallest increases in a decade. This annual inflation rate, combined with our loss of state funding equaled to \$847,318, created a challenging situation for the School Board.

We are offering early retirement incentives, cutting unfilled positions, choosing not to repave the Moharimet parking lot, and will be forgoing a new carpet for Mast Way's library.

However, the real story isn't about numbers or financial operations. It's about maintaining an unwavering focus on our students' needs.

Parents, guardians, and teaching staff's high expectations coupled with engaging coursework are the reasons our students distinguish themselves.

Message from the Superintendent (continued)

Oyster River is highly competitive, and we are proud to be one of the highest performing school systems in the country.

Our high aggregate SAT score of 1118 with 82% participation is one of the highest in the state and our math scores are 27% above state average. In 2022, our high school's graduation rate was 98.58% and our college placement was 83%.

Our students shine locally and internationally. The Middle School's Robotics Club sent three teams to the world championship in Dallas last year, and the following High School athletic clubs won their respective state championships: Division II Golf (2021), Unified Soccer Team (2021), Girls' Cross Country (2022) and selected music students participated in All States.

Recent recognition of our staff's achievements includes Alida Carter receiving the New Hampshire Department of Education's NH PE Teacher of the Year Award (2022-2023) and Val Wolfson receiving the NH Social Studies Teacher of the Year.

Nevertheless, not all children thrive academically. It is therefore imperative we maintain a holistic perspective of their development. To the end, Oyster River has implemented a multi-tiered support system (MTSS), prioritized social emotional learning (SEL), mental health, and suicide prevention. These initiatives have proven to be vital to our community schools.

Each year school districts throughout the nation encounter students who experience homelessness. It is important as a district that everyone has some knowledge about homelessness to ensure the immediate enrollment, school stability, and academic support needed to increase the educational success of homeless children and youth.

The McKinney-Vento Act is a Federal law that addresses the educational needs of children and youth experiencing homelessness. The purpose of the McKinney-Vento Act is to address any educational barriers and challenges created by homelessness by guaranteeing students experiencing homelessness the right to enroll in and attend school, and providing supports needed for school success.

DEIJ Update

Hi Bobcats!

I'm excited to share some of the highlights from the great work we were able to accomplish as a community this past semester in diversity, equity, and inclusion, and announce our goals for spring. In the short amount of time within my position, we were able to grow significantly in our district efforts towards equity and I am incredibly proud of the work we have been able to accomplish and the projects we can look forward to ahead.

Fall 2022 Highlights:

- Over 70% of our teaching staff completed the DEIJ Teacher Needs Assessment which outlined thoughtful and intentional questions to gauge the needs of our faculty when it comes to topics of diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- I was able to serve as a thought partner to teachers >25 times to support in navigating curriculum questions and difficult discussion topics last semester, along with being invited to attend classrooms and lead guest lessons.
- I made strong connections with district groups and built community ties with local organizations such as: DEIJ Professional Learning Communities, New Hampshire School Administrator Association (NHSAA), statewide DEIJ Directors, Oyster River Alumni Association, Oyster River Equity & Justice, and New Hampshire Listens.

- Our DEIJ Community Group was able to meet monthly and focused on priority actions like creating more opportunities to engage in difficult dialogue and conversations, hosting more community events, sharing and collaborating with other DEIJ community groups, and sustaining the longevity of the multistakeholder group.
- A large focus entering in my new role was to introduce myself to the community which I was able to accomplish in multiple ways, including Teacher Workshop Day introductions at all schools, scheduled days in school buildings, Coffee & Conversations with elementary school teachers, high school assembly introduction to students, reading to kindergartners, and engaging with community events.

Spring 2023 Semester Goals:

- Coordinate the spring 2023 district visit with Tona Brown.
- Continue to convene and facilitate the Superintendent's DEIJ Community Group and Steering Committee.
- Create a teacher DEIJ professional development plan, design and implement relevant workshops, and share resources with faculty and staff.
- Develop working DEIJ competencies and the transgender & gender expression policy.

Oyster River Middle School Certified LEED Gold

Our Middle School is the first New Hampshire project to achieve Eversource's Zero-Net Energy/Deep Energy Savings incentive program. The District estimates it will earn almost \$300,000 in rebates once verified. ORMS is the eighth school project in New England to achieve LEED V4 Gold for Building Design and Construction (LEED BD+C): Schools.
