Dear Oyster River Community,

This is the last budget I am presenting before I retire on June 30th. To say it has been an honor to serve as superintendent of this school district would be an understatement.

From my first time meeting your children, I knew this was a special place. I have never met so many students whose desire to learn was so obvious. You have raised very special young people. On top of that, the dedicated staff, administrators, teachers, and support personnel who rise to every occasion and actively look for ways to reach every child's needs, are awe inspiring. Parents and caregivers demand excellence from us, and it motivates us to do even better work.

Finally, the communities of Durham, Lee, and Madbury are models for how three towns can come together to support public education in a way that makes this district an exemplar throughout the state. In addition, Barrington's high school students have blended beautifully at Oyster River High School.

As a district, we continue to outperform the state on the only measure used universally, the SAT. Our composite score was 1119, while the state was 944 and the national was 954.

Oyster River recently placed third in the State of New Hampshire in a study conducted by Stanford and Harvard researchers evaluating grades 3 through 8 math test scores. The story published in the <u>New York</u> <u>Times</u> includes a database of grade scores for public schools in 41 different states, showing how each one is recovering from pandemic learning loss. More on this in Assistant Superintendent Filippone's report below.

Although we are doing very well academically, our major area of concern, post-pandemic, continues to be the mental health of our students. We have seen a seven-fold increase in referrals for assessments. As a result, the School Board has included a licensed mental health counselor in the proposed 24-25 budget.

Another area that deserved attention is the strings program. This program started ten years ago with less than three dozen students and has grown to over 260 young musicians due to the efforts of Strings Teacher Andrea von Oeyen. Having a ratio of 260:1 is unsustainable, so the School Board has included an additional strings position in the proposed 24-25 budget.

We have reached the final year of building up the district's ability to pay for the new middle school. This budget includes the last increase of \$586,044. After this proposed budget, the entire middle school bond will be built into the on-going operating budget. The building has been an incredible success and will serve the district for decades to come.

The major challenge for this budget is 15.1% increase in the cost of health insurance or nearly a million dollars. This increase is the second largest in my tenure as superintendent. Other factors impacting the

proposed budget include an increase in utilities which have increased by more than \$200,000 and the annual negotiated salary increases for the following:

- Oyster River Teachers Guild: \$709,317
- Oyster River Administrator's Association (ORAA): \$95,905
- Oyster River Educational Support Personnel Association (ORESPA): \$77,505
- Oyster River Paraeducators and Support Staff (ORPaSS): \$136,126

The district also negotiated a new contract with Oyster River Intervention and Tutor Association (ORITA), Warrant Article 4, that includes \$139,846.63 in pay and benefit increases. The School Board lowered the impact of these increases by offering a retirement incentive with a projected savings of \$315,000. The Board also approved additional revenue of over \$1,000,000 that helps lower the impact of the budget on taxes. Overall, the budget is up 4.17% or a proposed budget of \$56,415,352.

Assistant Superintendent's Report

The ORCSD was recently ranked third in New Hampshire in a study conducted by Stanford and Harvard researchers who analyzed math test scores in grades 3 through 8. The story published in the <u>New York</u> <u>Times</u> includes a database of grade scores for public schools in 41 different states, showing how each one is recovering from pandemic learning loss.

This research found that Oyster River students show little loss during the pandemic and large academic gains post-COVID, which is something we can corroborate through our own local assessment data using STAR.

District highlights from our recent Deliberative Session include:

- 99% High school graduation rate
- 100% Special Education graduation rate
- 83% College placement rate
- High aggregate SAT score of 119 with a 95% participation rate
- 61% of students met or exceeded the SAT match benchmark (compared to a 35% state average)

Acadience, STAR, the NH SAS, and the PSAT/SAT are districtwide assessments administered at the ORCSD. Acadience and STAR assessments are curriculum-based measurements that are used for benchmarking at regular intervals and monitoring progress allowing for long-term instructional goals with an end grade level objective.

The NH SAS and the SAT are statewide assessments administered to certain grade levels at the local level by our faculty and staff. The PSAT is an optional test administered for merit scholarship and SAT preparation. All of these are summative snapshots of a student's learning and performance.

We are grateful for the Oyster River community's continued support and investment in our students' success.

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion & Justice

Due to several instances of discriminatory graffiti at the middle school and high school, our community was unfortunately recently faced with a reckoning. District leadership and school administration publicly addressed the community-at-large, held grade-level presentations and, at the high school, had faculty lead require advisory discussion activities rooted in education about hate speech, antisemitism, and racism.

This incident and the community's response to it were opportunities for growth and demonstrated the importance of learning topics of hard history to better inform students on the impact of certain words, phrases, and symbols.

Poet Robert Penn Warren said, "History cannot give us a program for the future, but it can give us a fuller understanding of ourselves, and of our common humanity, so that we can better face the future." With this in mind, I have been working with the high school principal to create educational opportunities in advisory sessions, such as an activity on personal values and self-betrayal. I will offer another activity focused on belonging and inclusion in April and I have worked with the middle school principal to confirm a guest speaker for kindness week to address the power of language with all grades.

My other ongoing projects also support our goals of inclusion. In particular, the DEIJ Community Group will be hosting a community-wide event in early May centered on the theme of belonging, building empathy, and understanding through storytelling and lived experiences. I will facilitate a workshop for teachers and staff for the upcoming March Teacher Workshop called "Bias Bootcamp" and the national organization Gay, Lesbian & Straight Education Network (GLSEN) will implement a four-part training series on Intentional Inclusion.

As I start planning learning opportunities and programs for next year, I am keeping this work as my core focus. I am committed to furthering the work of cultivating an inclusive and accepting district culture and I look forward to sharing more with you in the coming months.
