Dear Oyster River,

As we enter the holiday season and with our first quarter behind us, our hearts turn to the joy of spending time with loved ones and the spirit of togetherness. Yet, for many families in our community, this time of year can also be a time of additional financial and emotional stress. I've witnessed firsthand the challenges families face during this period and wish to share the following resources with you.

Oyster River schools help through donation programs, the coordination of food baskets for families, and the program 68 Hours of Hunger which provides groceries to families in need. Families may opt in or out of 68 Hours of Hunger at any time and there is no income qualification to receive assistance. Benefiting from this program will not affect a family's ability to receive free and reduced meals. Additional details may be found on our website by clicking here.

We also work closely with local community organizations to connect families with additional resources. As you read on you will find additional information provided by Assistant Superintendent Filippone regarding homelessness.

Beyond material support, we're also committed to fostering a sense of community and belonging. You might have heard about the middle school's <u>Coffee Connection</u> initiative, a project started by two Oyster River Middle School team members to help students develop their social communication and functional skills, which evolved into a joyful weekly coffee shop creating a sense of school community.

Our elementary schools are collaborating with community partners to bring to life enrichment activities on the topics of <u>"Year of Water"</u> (Moharimet) and "This Land" (Mast Way). The high school Student Senate hosted a <u>mental health panel</u> focused on breaking the stigma related to mental health.

Every year, many of you experience firsthand our school's <u>fall activities</u> and holiday-themed events, a beloved opportunity to come together for celebration of student performances. These events not only provide a sense of joy and connection but also create a network of

Our schools are not just places of learning, they are a community, and we at ORCSD place student success at the heart of everything we do.

Assistant Superintendent's Message

Like many school districts throughout the nation, we in Oyster River also work with students and families who experience homelessness. In fact, during the first few months of the school year, we have seen the number of students impacted by homelessness double.

It is important to talk about homelessness to ensure homeless children and youth can receive the support they need. As a district we have directed additional resources to students and have found new ways to address educational barriers and challenges created by homelessness.

New this year is a free hygiene pantry for students in need. If you are interested in supporting the pantry, we are currently accepting donations of the following items:

- Body soap
- Cleaning products
- Dental floss
- Deodorant
- Facial cleanser
- Feminine hygiene products
- Laundry detergent
- Lotion
- Shampoo and conditioner
- Shaving cream
- Toothbrush and toothpaste

You may bring these items to the ORCSD district office (<u>36 Coe Dr, Durham, NH 03824</u>) during business hours.

As Assistant Superintendent, one of my roles is to act as homeless liaison for our district. In this capacity I work with schools to support homeless students and ensure compliance with the federal law that addresses the educational needs of homeless children and youth (McKinney-Vento Act). The McKinney-Vento Act established the definition of *homeless* used by public schools and guarantees the protection of children's educational rights such as the right to enroll in and attend school. It also provides support for academic success.

Inclement Weather Season

This is a reminder, as we soon enter inclement weather season, that there is no perfect weather call. Having the following options help us determine the end of the school year with more predictability which benefits everyone.

- Snow days: We will use snow days for predicted heavy snow events.
- Remote Learning: We will use remote learning days when experiencing significant winter weather.
- <u>Delayed Start</u>: We will use delay starts when the weather is predicting thaw by midmorning.

Free and Reduced Meals Applications

Free and reduced meals applications can be <u>completed online</u>. Applications are also available at each school's front office and nurse's office upon request. Please be sure the application you complete has the current school year listed on it as we are, unfortunately, unable to accept previous years applications.

68 Hours of Hunger

The district offers a weekend food program for students called 68 Hours of Hunger. The program is named for the 68 hours between a students' last weekly Friday school meal and their next one the following Monday. There is no income qualification for this program. ParentSquare Communications

Parents and guardians are encouraged to register their account by visiting ParentSquare.com. You may also customize your notification settings. The "instant" setting will send all posts notifications in real-time. The "digest" setting sends direct messages, alerts, and time-sensitive posts instantly, but sends all non-time sensitive posts at the end of the day, reducing the number of notifications you receive daily. Parking Restrictions at the ORCSD District Office

Parking at the SAU and Service Building during business hours is by permit only (36 Coe Dr, Durham, NH 03824). Vehicles parked during business hours that are not displaying a valid SAU parking permit will be ticketed by the Town of Durham.

Important Traffic Information

Thank you for your collaboration and patience during school pick-up and drop-off at the Oyster River middle and high schools. Mornings and afternoons can be hectic, and we understand how frustrating it can be to sit in traffic. Due to the increased amount of traffic this year, it is

important to remember the importance of the following safety rules and the importance of planning your commute with traffic in mind.

- Drop off and pick up are only permitted in dedicated areas
- Do not attempt to pass vehicles using the middle or opposing lane
- When instructed to stop by our School Resource Office, you must immobilize your vehicle immediately
- U-turns are not permitted on the road

Volunteers made popcorn, helped by decorating and cleaning up after the event. DeMerritt Hill Farm cider and baked goods were available for purchase.




Before and After School Opportunities

Red Ribbon Week


The week of October 23-27 high school students and staff celebrated Red Ribbon Week, the nation's largest and longest-running drug-use prevention campaign.
